


#### The Celebrant continues:



## About the music at today's service

The Advent Prose is a series of texts adapted from the book of the prophet Isaiah, sung during the season of Advent. Its original Latin form, "Rorate caeli,", is attributed to Aurelius Clemens Prudentius, the fourth-century Christian poet. It is sung this morning in its traditional English translation.

John Joubert was born in 1927 in Cape Town, South Africa, and after moving to Great Britain, was on the faculty of the University of Birmingham for many years. Joubert is prolific composer in all genres, but has a particular affinity for the human voice. *There is no Rose* was written in 1954, and has become part of the standard cathedral repertoire. One can hear the influence of the grace of Benjamin Britten's lyrical style as well as William Walton's rhythmic approach.

The arrangement of *The Cherry Tree Carol* heard today was composed by Stephen Cleobury, Organist and Director of Music at King's College, Cambridge since 1982. The artful arrangement of Christmas carols has been a preoccupation of choirmasters at Kings for years. Cleobury's predecessors include Boris Ord, David Willcocks, and Philip Ledger.

The original "Cherry Tree Carol" was a trio of English folk songs from around the 15<sup>th</sup> century. The first part of the collective work was "Joseph Was an Old Man," the second was "As Joseph Was A-Walking," and the third was "Mary's Question," an Easter song.

The story of Christmas has always invited questions about the relationship between Mary and Joseph. If Joseph knew he was not Jesus' father, could it not have been another man? If so, would not Joseph have been angry? The picking of fruit (an image as old as the story of Adam and eve) plays a role in many of the stories that attempt to explore this relationship. The apocryphal Gospel of Pseudo-Matthew recounts how during their flight into Egypt, Mary, Joseph and the infant Jesus stop to rest under a palm tree. Mary asks Joseph to pick her some fruit; he doesn't want to; Jesus speaks; the tree bows down; Mary gathers fruit; Joseph asks forgiveness. Similarly, a play performed in Coventry since the 15th century has a scene where, on the road to Bethlehem, Joseph begs Mary's forgiveness

after a cherry tree, from which he'd refused to pick some fruit, bends down in response to her prayer. This carol tells a similar story.

This miraculous cherry tree reminds us of the Tree of Life (which bestowed original immortality on Adam and Eve) and the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil in Genesis 2:9. While Eve's tasting of the fruit of the Tree of Knowledge brought disobedience and death into the world, Mary's eating of the fruit of the cherry tree identifies her as the "new Eve," from which obedience (even unto death) and eternal life will come in the person of Jesus Christ.

Since his youth James MacMillan has been devoutly Catholic. In addition to a busy schedule composing and conducting, he directs the amateur choir at St. Columba's Church, Maryhill, in Glasgow, Scotland. The Chamber Choir of nearby Strathclyde University also makes occasional appearances at St. Columba's. For these two ensembles MacMillan composed a series of Strathclyde Motets. They vary in difficulty and mood. O Radiant Dawn is one of the simplest in construction but darkest in color. The text is that of the "O Antiphons" for December 21. The harmonies are spare, even severe, as befits an appeal for the coming dawn or the imminent birth of Christ.

Widely known as a Lutheran church musician, recitalist, improvisationalist, and educator, Paul Manz (1919-2009) is particularly identified with the motet *E'en so, Lord Jesus, quickly come*. The work had its genesis in a personal experience for Paul and his wife, Ruth, as they maintained an all-night hospital vigil with their firstborn son, whom they had been told would not likely survive the night. An initial sketch of the work, a setting of a paraphrase from the twenty-second chapter of the Revelation to John by Ruth Manz, became the inspiration for this choral classic. Their son John survived to become a highly respected Lutheran pastor and seminary professor.

For the last 200 years, the St. Luke's community has cared for the needs of our neighborhood and city with hospitality and imagination.

Food insecurity has remained a permanent concern for our city. Since the COVID pandemic, the numbers of people in line at food pantries and community kitchens has skyrocketed. "It's never been this tragic for such a sustained period of time," said Rosanna Robbins, director of food access and capacity at City Harvest. "We expect there to be a real need for free food for a very long time." In New York City, an estimated 2 million residents are now facing food insecurity – a number which has nearly doubled during the pandemic.

Faced with a consistent stream of folks these last six months asking for help securing their next meal, we made a decision: Instead of waiting for folks to find us, we'll go to them.

On Tuesday and Thursday mornings, we will gather to make and distribute meals and hygiene supplies along routes in our neighborhoods where we believe we'll encounter the folks who will need them.
