
THE SECOND LESSON Acts 19:1-7

John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. THE RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL VOWS

All stand. The Celebrant says

Through the Paschal mystery, dear friends, we are buried with Christ by Baptism into his death, and raised with him to newness of life. I call upon you, therefore, to renew the solemn promises and vows of Holy Baptism, by which we once renounced Satan and all his works, and promised to serve God faithfully in his holy Catholic Church.

Celebrant	Do you reaffirm your renunciation of evil and renew your commitment to Jesus Christ?
People	I do.
Celebrant	Do you believe in God the Father?
People	I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.
Celebrant People	Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God? I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.
Celebrant People	Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit? I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.
Celebrant	Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers ?
People	I will, with God's help.
Celebrant People	Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord? I will, with God's help.
Celebrant	Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?
People	I will, with God's help.
Celebrant	Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself?
People	I will, with God's help.
Celebrant	Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?
People	I will, with God's help.

The Celebrant concludes the Renewal of Vows as follows

May Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has given us a new birth by water and the Holy Spirit, and bestowed upon us the forgiveness of sins, keep us in eternal life by his grace, in Christ Jesus our Lord. Amen.






And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.





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About the music at today's service

Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina is generally regarded as one of the greatest composers of the Renaissance: his sacred works were long held up as models of Roman Catholic liturgical music. Born in the Italian town of Palestrina, the name of which he added to that of his own family, Giovanni Pierluigi was a chorister in the Roman Basilica of Santa Maria Maggiore. In 1544, Palestrina returned home to serve as music director in the cathedral of Palestrina. There he remained until 1551, when Pope Julius III (a former bishop of Palestrina) recalled him to Rome. For the next 43 years, until his death, Palestrina exerted an ever-growing influence on the musical life of Rome. In addition to serving at St. Peter's, he was active during various periods at Santa Maria Maggiore, Saint John Lateran, and the Jesuit Collegium Romanum. While occupying the Church's highest musical posts, Palestrina also served the cause of secular music in the households of princely patrons.

We know nothing at all about Thomas Crecquillon until he appears in the records of Holy Roman Emperor Charles V's chapel in 1540 as a priest and a Master of Arts. The entirety of his known career was in the service of the Emperor, and he was a loyal member of Charles's household. In Imperial records, he is mentioned as *maistre de la chapelle* three times, and he apparently succeeded Adrian Thibault in 1538. When the chapel was reorganized in 1545, he relinquished his role as *maistre* and became de facto court composer. He traveled widely with Charles fulfilling his responsibilities within the Imperial Chapel, and he was known to have been in Spain from 1541 to 1543 and in the German lands from 1545 to 1548. Crecquillon very likely died of the plague at Béthune in 1557, during a known epidemic.

He was held in high regard judging by the number of personal commissions from the Emperor. We are fortunate that much of Crecquillon's work has survived, including 12 masses, over 200 chansons and 125 motets, among which are two Lamentation cycles. His work was published mainly in anthologies and was printed and disseminated well into the 17th century. His motets were included by Lassus in the choir books of the Bavarian ducal chapel and also appear in several printed editions circulated in Germany during the last years of the 16th Century.

Today's Offertory Hymn, "When Jesus went to Jordan's stream", is an English translation of Martin Luther's Baptismal hymn "Christ, unser Herr, zum Jordan kam." The German original was in seven stanzas and must have been written around 1541. It is the last of five hymns that Luther wrote on the main parts of his Catechism. The tune used today began to be associated with the hymn beginning around 1543, and since then they have been firmly wedded. Two organ chorale preludes on this tune, by Johann Pachelbel and Dietrich Buxtehude comprise the Prelude to today's service.

It is a way for people to find their way "home" to St. Luke's, whether from another tradition, no tradition, or a life-time with the Episcopal Church. The program consists of three parts, listed below. The Discovery Series is open to anyone interested in the subject matter, and the latter two parts are for those who have completed the Discovery Series and wish to proceed as candidates to be presented to the Bishop at the Easter Vigil on **April 3rd, 2021**. All candidates are paired with a sponsor who will introduce them more deeply to the life and ministries of St. Luke's Church. Candidates are expected to attend all four sessions of the Discovery Series and to participate in all subsequent meetings of the program. Full participation in the liturgies of Holy Week is strongly encouraged.

Adult Education: Anti-Racism Ministry

With the deaths of George Floyd and others, we are once again grappling with systemic racism as has almost every generation since the civil war. It was hotly debated in the 1960s resulting in the Civil Rights Act, and now a generation later the issue is once again in the forefront. Adult Education: Anti-Racism Ministry is a new series to identify and discuss contemporary and historical issues of race, color, and ethnicity and their impact on our society in order to enable change in perspective, both individually and collectively, to encourage anti-racism in the broader community. It is designed as a safe place for members of our parish and community to gain a deeper understanding of how racism affects our lives.

The initial focus for discussion will center on the book by Ijeoma Oluo, *So You Want to Talk About Race*. We will be discussing the book in segments over the course of several weeks where we will share our understanding of what the author is teaching us about race. During our first session we will be discussing chapters one and two. For the last 200 years, the St. Luke's community has cared for the needs of our neighborhood and city with hospitality and imagination.

Food insecurity has remained a permanent concern for our city. Since the COVID pandemic, the numbers of people in line at food pantries and community kitchens has skyrocketed. "It's never been this tragic for such a sustained period of time," said Rosanna Robbins, director of food access and capacity at City Harvest. "We expect there to be a real need for free food for a very long time." In New York City, an estimated 2 million residents are now facing food insecurity – a number which has nearly doubled during the pandemic.

Faced with a consistent stream of folks these last six months asking for help securing their next meal, we made a decision: Instead of waiting for folks to find us, we'll go to them.

On Tuesday and Thursday mornings, we will gather to make and distribute meals and hygiene supplies along routes in our neighborhoods where we believe we'll encounter the folks who will need them. In addition to meals, masks, hygiene kits, and resource lists, we will provide a supplemental pantry bag with grab-and-go items appropriate for those without access to a kitchen.

Vestry Elections for the Annual Meeting
